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CMS EcoCharter

On the next page is a copy of the new EcoCharter that has been drafted by the EcoCommittee.

It combines the school values of Responsibility, Respect, Care, Resilience and Pride with the actions we wish to take to make our school more sustainable. Although there is work still to be done, this year the EcoCommittee and Whole School Community have some tangible environmental achievements.

Highlights have included:

- Our Biodiversity Day which raised £300 to protect and preserve biodiversity.
- Supporting the Eco Festival at St Andrew's Church, Corbridge - sharing good practice with the local community.
- Being named as overall winners of the national Terracycle pen recycling competition and donating £1000 to West Northumberland Foodbank and the Northumberland Wildlife Trust.
- Had a winning art design featured on the side of one of the Council's bin lorries travelling around Tynedale.
- Two of our EcoCommittee members gave a presentation on the excellent work we do in school at the Sustainable Schools Summit in Birmingham.
- The EcoCommittee gave plastic awareness assemblies and removed single use plastic bottles from the dining hall (after a ~10-year campaign by Dr Batchelder - never give up)!

We're looking forward to seeing what progress the EcoCommittee can make in 2023-24!

Corbridge Middle School EcoCharter

Drafted by the EcoCommitte in June 2023

The EcoCommittee will use form time discussions, assemblies and themed awareness days to help educate our school community on the importance of environmental awareness and how individuals can make a difference. We will consult with pupils and staff on our plans and we will keep people updated on any planned developments or events. Change is difficult, we will show **RESILIENCE** to ensure the school community becomes more sustainable.

Specific action points:

- **Waste** – We will encourage the school community to be **RESPONSIBLE** when using equipment, materials, and resources to prevent waste including everything from Art supplies to PE equipment.
- **Energy** – When not required we will turn off lights, projectors and computers or laptops to reduce energy use.
- **Water** – We turn off taps and report leaks around school to reduce wasting of water.
- **Food and Healthy living** – We try to reduce food waste and promote a healthy diet for people and the planet.
- **Biodiversity** – We treat nature with **RESPECT**. We will look for innovative ways to create areas for wildlife.
- **Litter** – We take **PRIDE** in our school. We will not drop litter and if we see some litter on the ground, we will put it in the bin. Litter picks will help keep rubbish to a minimum.
- **Global Citizenship** – We act local but think global. We **CARE** and understand the actions that we take in Corbridge will have an impact on everyone.



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Green Power 2023



For the third year running, the Year 6 GreenPower electric car team visited Gateshead Stadium to compete against 23 local teams in the North East 2023 competition. Twelve children built the car and bodywork from scratch, choosing the sea turtle as their design. SDG 14 - Life Below Water - highlights the increasing challenges living things face in our rivers and oceans every day.

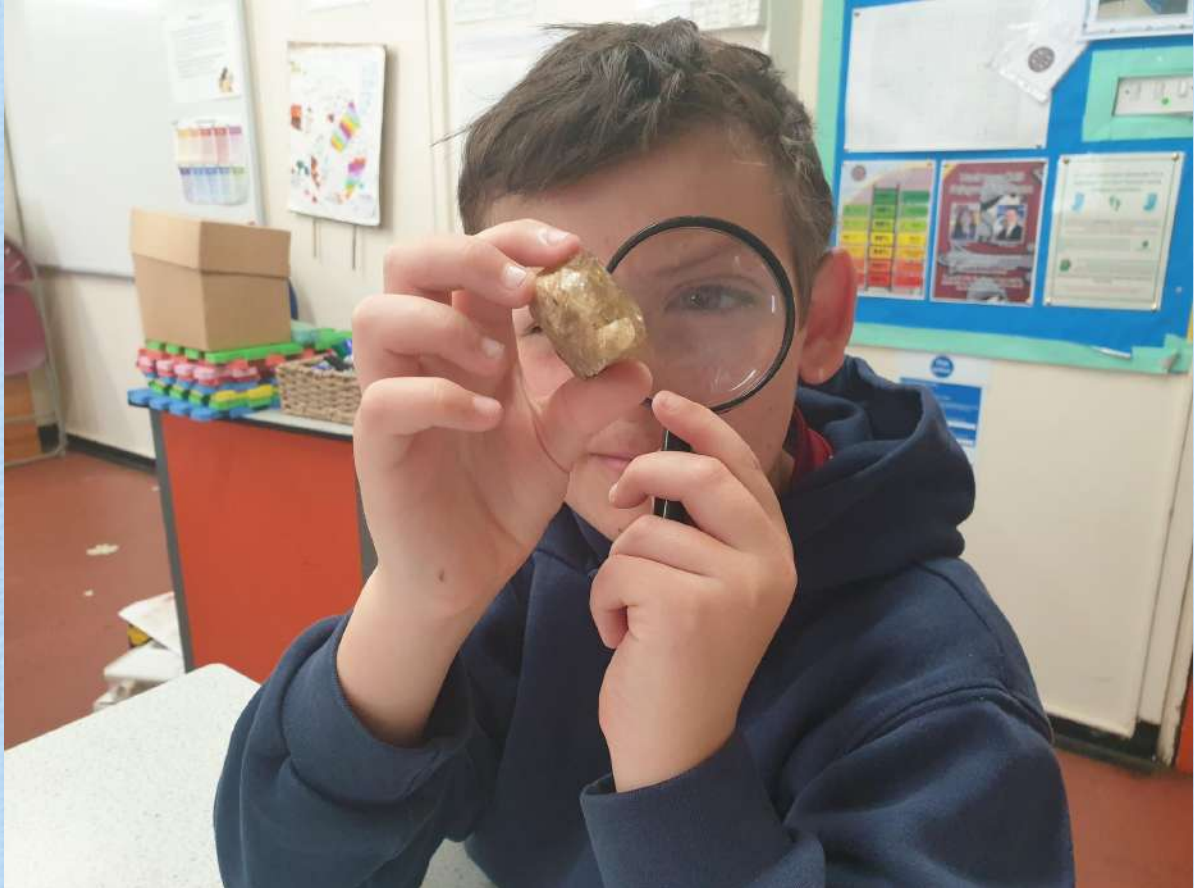

This term we were delighted to welcome The Common Room to school for some STEM enrichment sessions.

Year 6 are currently studying adaptations and evolution and enjoyed a Lego workshop to build Arthropleura - a many-legged insect. Year 7 completed the School of Rocks activity learning about the ground beneath our feet which ties in with their next topic of Earth and Atmosphere.

Year 8 students are about to study electricity as their final science topic in school. 8W and 8V had a session on the advantages and disadvantages of electric cars, they then used their team-working skills to build a Lego model. It was another STEMtastic opportunity for the pupils to learn from other scientists in the region.



Biodiversity Day



For the national Great Big Green Week our EcoCommittee held the first Corbridge Middle School Biodiversity Day.

The pupils had a roarsome time celebrating life on Earth! There were an incredible array of living organisms represented including spiders, squid, butterflies, lemurs and lions. The competition for the best costume in KS2 was won by a creative cheetah and in KS3 the prize was collected by an extraordinary elephant.

Between the cake sale and donations for dressing-down the event raised just over £300 which will be used to help conserve biodiversity by adopting wild animals with the World Wildlife Fund, supporting animals in Chester Zoo and to promote our own biodiversity on the school grounds. The day will also be used as evidence to gain accreditation as an EcoSchool and is supported by the Northumberland Sustainable Schools Network. We are delighted that Adam was announced as the overall Junior Science Award winner. The judges were particularly impressed with Adam's methodical manner, passion and enthusiasm.

Dr Batchelder is immensely proud of Adam and of the Weather and Climate Club team who were also in the finals. Corbridge Middle was the only school in the North East to be shortlisted in this national competition - a real accolade for our young scientists.



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Go Green Gorillas



At an exciting finals event in the House of Lords in London our Go Green Gorillas were named as one of the Young Green Briton Challenge winners. They wowed the judges with a video they made explaining how they grew salad that was eaten in school dinners, created a wormery to make fertiliser, held plant and seed sales to raise funds and demonstrated resilience when the polytunnel was damaged. The team intend to use the £1000 investment prize to support and promote School Gardening. The challenge involved 3,000 young people across 16 schools so their win was really sensational.

We made the most of the trip to London with a visit to the Sealife Centre and plenty of sightseeing. Apparently we just missed King Charles arriving at Buckingham Palace by a few minutes but Dr Batchelder and Mrs Pound did get a chance to talk to Chris Packham one of the Young Green Briton Ambassadors!

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E-Safety Focus



National Online Safety[®]

Each week we are providing some guidance for Parents and Carers about a particular app or online service which you may find useful. The guides can be found on our Friday Flyer and give a useful insight and highlight key safety features which many parents have found useful.

This week's spotlight is on W App

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Developed in Germany, this social networking app is called 'W App' in the Apple Store and Google Play but is also branded as 'Slay' in some territories. Aimed primarily at teens and marketed as a 'zero-negativity' zone, it asks users to connect with others from their school. They are then asked a positive question (such as "Who is the nicest person?") and shown four people from their school to choose from. All users from a school can appear in the poll: not just those a child is friends with. The app is mainly anonymous – but *does* offer clues to reveal who selected you for each question.

LIBRARY

FAKE ACCOUNTS

There is no verification when signing up to W App. Once someone joins, they can see all users at their school and add them if they wish. Users provide their name, gender, school and grade – but are also able to change these (aside from their name) as often as they like. This concerned our expert: predators could potentially keep attempting to build connections with children at different schools.

PROFILE OVERSHARING

Young people tend to have multiple social media accounts, so it's vital their identity is protected online. By default, W App shares someone's school and grade, while users choose whether to share their full name, photo and other social accounts. Most people appear to select this – making it easier for someone to build up a picture of who they are, what they enjoy and where they go to school.

SPAMMING CONTACTS

The app's activity feed notifies a user when they have been put forward for a poll. They're then given the option to reveal the initial of the person who nominated them, by inviting a friend to join the app. The friend doesn't have to sign up, but they will receive a 'get the app now' text, followed by a link. This process could result in texts being continually sent to a child's contacts.



CATFISHING RISKS

As well as invented fake accounts, users could also sign up and pretend to be someone else from their school. By joining under another person's name (possibly with their photo), they can take part in polls while masquerading as that other person. Some polls hint at an attraction or crush, which – if deliberately misused by imposters – could result in misunderstandings and embarrassment for teens.

SUBSCRIPTION COSTS

W App is free to download and use, but there is also a 'gold membership' package (costing £4.99 per week) available. Subscribing allows users to reveal the names of people who selected them in polls (slightly defeating the point of it being an anonymous app), gives unlimited hints and offers exclusive play modes – all of which may tempt a curious young user into spending their money.

REPEATED USE

Like most other social media platforms, W App wants users to log in regularly. Every time someone completes a set of 12 polls, they earn virtual coins. These can be cashed in for perks such as being included in random polls (so that more users will see them) or adding their name to their crush's poll. This may not seem much of an incentive currently, but that may alter as the app evolves.

Advice for Parents & Carers

DISCUSS FRIEND REQUESTS

Talk to your child about the risk of sharing their other social accounts, especially on anonymous platforms where there is no verification – so a user could be anyone. If someone they don't normally talk to at school approaches your child via W App and suggests connecting on TikTok, Snapchat or Instagram, emphasise that it's safest to confirm it with that person face to face before accepting or replying.

PROTECT PERSONAL INFORMATION

It's crucial that trusted adults regularly remind children about the importance of not sharing too much of their personal information online (and demonstrate it on their own social accounts, where possible). W App automatically displays the user's school on their profile – but if your child does want to use the app, you can advise them to only enter their first name and not to upload an image of their face.

BE MINDFUL OF REJECTION

The polls in W App are designed to be complimentary rather than negative. However, never being nominated or picked by their peers could leave a child – especially a status-conscious teen – feeling ignored and isolated. If you think that W App is having this effect on your child, it might be time for a supportive reminder that social media doesn't reflect someone's true worth or popularity.

DO SOME 'APP ADMIN'

Before letting your child download W App, you may want to (via their device's settings) disable the option to make in-app purchases: £4.99 per week for the subscription can soon mount up. Likewise, if a friend's use of W App is causing your child to be inundated with texts inviting them to sign up too, you could suggest asking that friend to stop selecting your child's name from their contacts list.
